Five students (three from the Class of '60) traveled to the Princeton-Yale football game the hard way in 1958. 130 miles in 27 hours of rain and mechanical problems—but it was worth all of it. Princeton beat Yale 50-14!

*As juniors, we were suave and confident ... Some of us became big men and others continued to have fun. We began to think in concepts and we learned what a junior paper was. For most, it was the thing you griped about, avoided as long as possible and then claimed you'd written the night before it was due. We had advisers and some began to know faculty members...The football season saw juniors... come to the fore. Our Tiger continued to entertain the crowds at half-time. Bicycling was all the rage that fall. A five-man bike... made headlines when it arrived in New Haven for the Yale game. Some say they didn't peddle the whole way, but who are we to destroy myths; if it's good enough for Life it's good enough for us...The basketball team lost in the heart-breaking, last-second of the Dartmouth play-off; [but we] broke Princeton hockey records in goals and total points scored. All but a few recalcitrant tweeds queued up to buy their white dungaree emblems of upper-class status and washed them till they looked worn. And the spring again saw bicycles in the limelight. 1879 Field was the scene of weeks of mechanized polo. We'd written junior papers and taken generals, but we hadn't grown up.*
